MEET THE CHARACTERS

QUINN A child who is about 7-10 years old. Any gender.

ARI A child who is about 7-10 years old. Any gender.

SETTING: A school classroom. It's morning.

TIME PERIOD: Around 2019-Present.

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EXCERPT

AT RISE: QUINN and ARI, both around 7-10 years old, are in their elementary school classroom. It's the beginning of the day when children are filing into the room. The class has been enjoying a Science Unit on the crayfish, and each child is responsible for studying their assigned crayfish (marked with permanent marker). There is a tank for the crayfish. ARI holds and examines a crayfish. QUINN is looking at the crayfish too.

QUINN Can you tell if that's your crayfish? ARI It could be Digger. But...I don't know for sure. QUINN What color permanent marker did you put on its back? ARI That maroon color. QUINN Well that one has maroon on it. So it's gotta be yours. ARI Yeah, but Juliet used the maroon on hers too. QUINN Why did she do that? You're not supposed to do the same color as someone else! ARI I know. I used it first. But she copied me. QUINN Mrs. Keefe didn't stop her? ARI

No, because that's when Adrian knocked into the art station and all that blue paint spilled on

the rug—

No—I mean, we could, I guess. But I'm saying I can tell which grandpa is which once they start talking—because they have different personalities.

Like the crayfish...

Like the crayfish! So? Is this one acting like Digger?
